## **QUESTIONS for the OBSERVER:**

1. What were the strengths of this lesson?  
Examples done on the computer with explanation. Progression in an accessible fashion. Good time management. Student response to his in-class exercises (to his two exercises, 73 and 76 students, respectively, responded). This is a very high response rate, and indicates that the students were following the material well.
2. What suggestions do you recommend for this instructor?  
He did quite a good job of covering the topic. On the last exercise (testing Roman numerals), he did not pause for long enough to allow the students to figure it out. He did have sufficient class time left for this.
3. Are there any additional comments you would like to share with the instructor?  
He has a very good rapport with the class. Sometimes no one responds to his questions, however. I would suggest more use of think-pair-share exercises, to get the students involved in discussing among themselves before they try to answer aloud.

1. What did you feel went well in this class session?

This was a technical topic with a lot of real-time programming. I felt that this went quite smoothly and that, overall, there were relatively few technical glitches. Students also seemed to enjoy the lecture and were engaged. This is also the second time that I have given this particular lecture, so I was much more comfortable about the topic that was to be presented to the class. Because of this, I also felt that I did a good job on time management, and covered the necessary material without having to go too quickly.

2. What would you like to change about this class session if you had to teach it again?

Class participation was sometimes difficult to illicit, but I think this was at least in part due to the fact that I was a guest lecturer and that the students were not familiar with me. In re-watching the recorded lecture, I also noticed that, at times, I did not pause long enough for students to reflect on the question and answer it. This is one area of improvement.

3. In the light of the observer's comments, what aspects of your teaching approach will you look at changing in the future? How will you do this?

One of items that the observer also noted was that, though the class was engaged, class participation was sometimes low. In the future, I would try to use more group activities for questions, such as think-pair share, in order to make students more comfortable with a new lecturer.

4. What have you found useful/not so useful about the observation process?

For this lecture, the observation was useful because the lecture was also recorded on video. This allowed me to discuss the observation with the observer, while simultaneously having access to the lecture itself for review.

For this observation, I used Observation Form Option 2. This form is easier for the observer to complete, but unfortunately, provides fewer insights into how to improve your lectures. In the future, I will instead continue to use Observation Form Option 1, which has many more short answer questions that allow the observer to provide details above and beyond simple checks.
